Pick City 1948-2023 Diamond Jubilee

1946 Located along Highway 7, Pick City was one of the few Garrison Dam Boom Towns. Named after General Lewis Pick.

Planes delivered supplies for the Garrison Dam Project: 'it was the biggest area for planes to fly in for deliveries'

Most of us were not even born when Pick City was established, so we use history to tell the story.

In July of 1946, the Village of Pick City was platted, and Mannhaven Realty sold shares for the town at \$100.00 a share. 16 people purchased ten shares each.

Back in the Day, Pick City was booming in 1947 we had grocery, hardware stores, service station, bars, hotel, repair garage, café and a Baseball Team! Schools & churches came later.

The First election was in 1948, on a 34-4 vote, The Village of Pick City was established.

The First celebration was called 'New Settler's Day' the county's Newest Town. New settlers In the Damsite Town planned a free BBQ, Baseball, Dancing, Airshow, and Whisker's Club judging.

The Pick City baseball team was made up of many players from families that still remain in the area, some of them are Sailers, Isaak, Kilber, Mayde, Bohrer, Baszler, Birkholz, and Stelzmiller.

The first marriage was Nadine Schultz & Glen Applegate on February 13, 1947. On April 11, 1947, the first baby Linda Herman was born and dubbed, "The Pick City Kid" her parents were Hilda & Ervin Herman.

In 1998 Pick City celebrated the 50th. In 2008 Pick City Celebrated the 60th. Now here in 2023, we are celebrating our Diamond Jubilee

Currently, today Pick City has five thriving business, Scott's Bait and Tackle, Little's Bar and Grill, The Dam Bar, Teresa's grocery and Sakakawea Motel.


For this celebration there is a lot of memorabilia on the walls at the City Hall. We hope you come and enjoy the history that created Pick city.

A history of Pick City 1948-1998

The building of Pick City is the result of millions of dollars in flood damage along the Missouri River. In 1942 and 1943, the Missouri River flooded tens of thousands of acres from Bismarck to St. Louis, prompting two federal agencies, the Bureau of Reclamation and the United States Army Corps of Engineers, to establish a flood control plan for the river.

The proposal would generate hydro-electric power and at the same time, irrigate land in the Missouri

River Basin.

The two plans merged into what is known as the Pick-Sloan Missouri Basin Plan. The plan called for the construction of a 12,000-foot long, 210-foot high, earthen dam, Garrison Dam, that would hold back 23 million acre feet of water to form Lake Sakakawea.

The Flood Control Act of 1949 appropriated money for the plan.

Pick City was one of the few Garrison Dam boom towns to be considered on the west side of the Missouri

In July of 1946, the town site of Pick City was platted. It was founded in 1947 in the W 1/2 of Sec. 36-147-85, one mile west of the dam site.

It was named for Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of the Army Corps of Engineers, and co-author of the Pickloan Plan.

It was organized as a village in 1948. An excerpt for the January, 29, 1948 Hazen Star reads:

Thirty-eight Pick City Voters turned out Tuesday to show a 34-4 preference for organization of a village form of government.

The entire 101 acres comprising Pick City was incorporated under the election. The actual village government of the new dam-site town will be formed after a regular village election in March.

Estimated population of Pick City now exceeds 200, and includes a number of people employed on various phases of dam and bridge construction, as well as people engaged in business.

The newest village in Mercer County boasts a grocery store, hardware store, two cafes, a bar, service station, garage, power plant, pool hall, and a hotel, besides a number of residential dwellings and apartment buildings.

Pick City brings the total of incorporated villages and cities in Mercer County to six.

The dam project brought a huge number of people from all over the country. Besides the construction workers, the thousands of people who came every year to watch the dam being built brought prosperity to the area.

People who settled in Pick City are mainly of German-Russian heritage. After the dam was completed in 1955, many of the construction workers left, but a few workers stayed to make Pick City their permanent home.

Today, many retired people and persons working in energy-related fields reside in Pick City. Tourism, in the way of fishing and hunting activities, continues to draw people from all over the county to Pick City each year.

Pick City is the self-proclaimed 'Salmon Capitol of North Dakota.'

In 1981, a new city hall and fire hall were constructed.

Today, the town supports a grocery store, two steak houses and lounges, a convenience store-bait and tackle shop, cafe, laundromat, gift shop, ice cream shop, car wash and a motel.

Pick City is just minutes from Garrison Dam, Lake Sakakawea, the Famous Tailrace, and Sakakawea State Park. A popular resort area with cabin numerous along the lake shores and your choice of recreational activities on and around the lake area. This area offers excellent salmon, northern pike, walleye, smallmouth bass, trout fishing. Some of the best water-fowl hunting in the United States is found here. Partridge, Pheasants and Sharptail Grouse, also offer good hunting. Mule deer and whitetail deer common to this area with annual hunting seasons.

the 1940's, two federal agencies, the Reclamation Bureau of Corps and Army Engineers, proposed plans control flooding. return, they would contribute to the generation of hydroelectric power and irrigate land in the basin. These plans merged into what became known as the Pick-Sloan Missouri Basin Plan.

Construction the Garrison Dam brought an influx of people from all areas. In Julv 1946 the town site of Pick City was platted. The town was named for General Lewis A. Pick of the Corps of Engineers who helped to develop the Pick-Sloan plan. organized village in 1948.

The Garrison Dam construction began in 1946 and was completed in 1955 at the cost of 300 million dollars. When it was built it was the largest rolled fill earth dam in the world and currently the 5th. The dam also creates the 3rd largest manmade lake in the U.S., Lake Sakakawea. The Garrison Dam embankment consists of 66.5 million yards of rolled earth fill and 1.5 million cubic yards of concrete. The width of the base of the dam is 2,600 feet and top width is 60 feet. The dam is 210 feet high and stretches across the Missouri River for 2.5 miles. The dam houses five hydropower generating units. Lake Sakakawea formed by the impoundment of the Missouri River is 178 miles long and has over 1,500 miles of shoreline. The lake is an excellent recreational source boasting great fishing, boating and camping. On June 1, 2011, the spillway gates were used for the first time lowering the dam. The Dam Bar was built in 1947 by Vince Mayde. Hard working crews during the construction of the dam deserved a place for cold brews. In July 2022, The Dam Bar was chosen as one of the Top 10 Best Dive Bars in North Dakota! Cheers to The Dam Bar as we remember those throughout the years, continue to share the stories & celebrate all the new memories to come.





























Pick City had their Boomtowners

In the earliest days of the dambuilding boom, Pick City came to be.

With the influx of people came a need for recreation, and for entertainment.

Not everyone was interested in the more notable 'attractions' available, and so baseball did a much better job of drawing a family crowd.

An early photo of the 'first team' found in the May 8, 1947 Hazen Star says that the recently organized team 'has managed to round up some of the best players in eastern Mercer County, and its prospects for the season are regarded excellent by other teams in the league."

In 1949 they played in the Garrison Damsite league, which included the Riverdale Engineers, Big Bend Dammers, and Kewitts Contractors.

According to their young catcher-in-training Armond Isaak, "I started in '46 or '47, and I was small. But they taught me how to catch ..."

Other memories indicate there was some action before the Pick City Boomtowners joined up in a league that included two Hazen teams, Beulah, Stanton, Halliday, Zap, and "a team from some farms south of Beulah," according to Isaak.

He had gone to Concordia High School in Minnesota, and came home in the summer, to help on the farm. And to play baseball, of course.

"It was kind of nice," Isaak adds, "I could drive the tractor, and just shut it off and go to baseball. We farmed a lot of the land around there," he says. Their farm included the areas now developed into housing lots, Cabin Sites Number One and Two.

The first ballfield was on the southeast side of the townsite, but they got some of the construction equipment, and built a better one.

"Right field was kind of sloped," says Isaak, "and there was no fence." Definitely a field advantage for a left-handed hitter. "Vince was a lefty," says Isaak.

Vince Mayde managed the team, and played as well. He was a first baseman, but played anywhere, often in the outfield.

"He would take any spot that we were short in," says Isaak. "Once he played the whole outfield by himself."

"He looked like a professional out in center field," comments Ben Sailer of Pick City, but he always tried to kill the ball, or he might have been a better hitter."

Ben was the only Sailer brother who didn't ever really play the game, but he remembers that the town always had a lot of fun with the game. "We had good fans, too," he says.

Sailer brothers Toby, Bill, Elder and Art are some of the names Ben mentions. "Richard was a pitcher," he remembers, and Armond agrees, saying that Richard pitched a long time – baseball into his fifties perhaps, and softball a decade longer.

Other players and their skills recalled by Isaak or Sailer were: Mike Eibach, at third base. "Good arm, threw like a bullet."

"He had the control," adds Armond. "Maybe four or five pitches to throw ..."

Augie Miller: "Fast. Fast."

Duane and Calvin Bohrer: "Pitchers, good ones."

Ken Stelzmiller, Art and Irvin Wolf of the Halliday area, Larry Henderson, and more.

"They were pretty good, too," Sailer adds. "Bismarck came up, and we shut them out. When some of the Corps guys who played for us switched teams and played for Riverdale, we went over there and beat them," he adds.

Garrison was another opponent the Boomtowners played regularly,

but Sailer says that it seemed as if the news of their success hardly ever was printed in rival towns' newspapers.

That lament is borne out by examination of past issues. When Pick City won, it appeared only in the local 'Pick City News' section. When the newspaper's home team won, the headlines were prominent on the page.

Armond played for the Boomtowners, since they were so close to home. He was of an age when he could play American Legion ball, but "Stanton was too far away, in those days. But I'd go play for them at tournament time," he adds.

Some accounts that did see print in the area papers of the time made mention of the outstanding play, or other significant developments in the competition.

"The Pick City Boomtowners lost their first league game in the second half [of the season] to Hazen due to the fact that five of their first team men were indisposed. However, the game was very close at that, 5 to 4." (1948)

"Pick City, the best dam city, invites everyone to attend our first home game to be played on Sunday, June 6. Mayor Eldor Bohrer will put the first ball across the plate to initiate our new ball park and the first home league game. A record crowd is anticipated. (1948)

"The Pick City team and spectators motored to Garrison on May 23 in a body – thanks to Chief of Police Flemming of Riverdale. ... On May 30, Pick City and delegation again crossed the river to meet the Underwood nine. This time Pick City was on the short end of the 12 to 8 score due to the fact that some players couldn't be released from work on the project."





Lukins Served Pick City Diners

Frieda Lukins, Pick City, is a "little bit more than 80" these days. She doesn't get around quite as well as she used to back in the days when she was cook, waitress and dishwasher at the E & E Diner owned by Esther and Elmer Albers in Pick City.

The diner (now Klein's Lakeside Grocery) was half a sawed-off boxcar on Pick City's main street and it catered to the Garrison Dam construction crowd. Frieda started work there in the early '50's and by then construction was slowing down.

They had it (boxcar) fixed up pretty good. There was no water, there was a well out back," she remembers.

"We made soup, pie, all of that, a lot of chili. There were some diners on the other side (of the river). They didn't all come to us.

"It wasn't a big place. We had a counter and two tables."

There were nice customers and rough ones. I never had anything to do with the rough ones."

She says the St. Paul's Lutheran Churchwomen put on a food stand in Pick City the hot summer day in 1953 when President Dwight Eisenhower came to view the finished project.

"People had to eat. We put up a food stand on the east side of

Sportsman's, just a counter with sandwiches and soup."

"It was a big day. Eisenhower doesn't come to see you every day. He was bald-headed, that's about all I remember."

She remembers the many people who lived in Pick City at the time. "There were a lot of nice people. Some of them are still friends," she says.

She has been in some of the people's gardens, and they don't like it. So please tie her up & keep her

home!"

PICK EXCERPTS

News highlights of Pick City, gleaned from the records of the Hazen Star. Feb. 13 was the first news from Pick City with Mrs. V.X. Mayde as correspondent.

Feb. 13, 1947

Pick City's first marriage came as a surprise to everyone. Glen Applegate and Nadine Schultz were married at Stanton on Feb. 10. Mr. and Mrs. Mayde were witnesses

The landowners in the Garrison Dam construction area have received releases on their buildings.

Irvin Herman's business has grown so much that he has hired a new hand to assist him.

Feb. 20, 1947

Eleven new members joined the Pick City community club, which met for the second time on Valentine's Day. Herbert Boherer reported to the club in regard to the well and electricity.

Upon closing the meeting, the junior members played cards while the senior members officially opened Mayde's new bar.

Feb 27, 1947

Tuesday, a crowd gathered in Pick City for a chivalry on the newly-married Applegates. Glen, the hardware man, took the crowd to the club for numerous refreshments. Dave Danielson and Mrs. Applegate gave everyone an good laugh when they arrived as a mock bride and groom.

Pete Mohl, Eldor and Helmuth Bohrer spent three days in Minneapolis, where they purchased 14 prefabricated houses. They also made arrangements for building material valued at \$2,000 more.

Other buildings moved to our city are: Garage building and house belonging to Eldor Bohrer; granary to be used to store building material of Helmuth Bohrer's; house owned by Herbert Mohl; house of Herbert Grosz's. In this group there are six more buildings to be moved.

March 6, 1947 **First Baby**

At Mrs. Becker's home, the Pick City ladies gave a shower for Mrs. Irvin Herman and our first baby. The hostess served cookies and coffee. Those present were the Mesdames Miller, Guenthner, Applegate, Zeiszler, Herbert Bohrer, Vernie Bohrer, Baisch, Mayde, Becker, Grosz, Eldor Bohrer and Herman. Mrs. Herman received many lovely and some necessary gifts for the "Pick City Kid."

Alice Becker was the first little girl to have a birthday and had the honor of receiving a spanking from her teacher.

March 13, 1947

Pick City's best news this week is that we have water.

Pick City boasts two new signs at the 9 mile point from Pick City to Hazen and Stanton.

Sheriff Adolph Richter, E. Suess and Andrew Erbele of Stanton were Pick City visitors Saturday night.

Pete Mohl moved a building in on Monday. This will be used as a service station.

Main street looked more like Hollywood boulevard Sunday. There was a steady stream of cars until well after dark.

As reported by Dave Danielson: Lost, strayed or stolen — One bum from Pick City. When last seen he was wearing a tuxedo coat with tobacco lining and patent leather shoes aced at the sole. Anyone finding same and in leaving him where he is will be prosecuted as the law directs.

March 20, 1947

The Midwest Motor Express was in our fair city with another load of material from Minneapolis.

By the time this paper goes to

press, Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Alderin will have their Pick City Cafe open. An eating place has been badly needed and the Alderins should be well supported.

A welcome visitor this week was T.O. Kirkwold, Northern Pacific representative.

A false rumor seems to have circulated to the effect that the Community club is for men only.

Work has resumed on the apartment building.

The Pick City Hardware is pretty well stocked.

Dave Danielson went to Stanton for a change of clothes. It took him four days to get back.

Fred Isaak has started drilling the second well for Pick City.

Herb Mohl is busy remodeling a granary into a house.

Pete Mohl is making all necessary arrangements for the opening of his service station.

April 3, 1947

Pick City received its largest house this week. It was moved from Beulah from Helmuth Bohrer.

The new Pick City Cafe is doing a pretty good business already.

The Pick City apartments are now ready to house some families. The apartments are nicely located with a view and when furnished should make attractive dwellings.

Pick City is probably the only city where planes land on Main Street. Sunday, a plane from Minot took passengers from Pick City over the Garrison Dam construction area, Riverdale and other boom towns on the east side of the river.

Kenneth Envart was in Pick City and vicinity on business regarding the ferry he will move here from Stanton. Mr. Enyart reports that the ferry can be used by civilians as well as army personnel.

May 8, 1947

Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Hermann have an addition to their family a baby girl born April 20 at Beulah.

May 15, 1947

Mr. and Mrs. "Butch" Uldeen are planning a new building to house their Pick City Cafe.

on the well machine. Louie hat off" to Sheriff Ricther for keep-Neuberger is lending a hand.

The Mannhaven Realty met to discuss the purchase of a light plant. The plant they have located is a 220-110 volt and will be available in approximately three weeks. Therefore, Pick City will have electricity and all the conveniences it brings shortly.

May 29, 1947

Fines for shaving were imposed upon Vernie Bohrer, Ervin Ellwein, Louie Portrey and Herb Stiefel.

Louie Portrey and Ervin Ellwein are so remorseful for taking out that razor that they have volunteered to purchase the steer for the barbecue. Andy Teske will slaughter the animal in order for the chefs, Mary and Butch to prepare the barbecue.

Hazen Nine Drops Two Games Pick City 10-4; Beulah 6-4.

June 5, 1947

Today is New Settler's day in Pick City, and the county's newest town is doing things up brown for its first celebration.

New settlers in the damsite town plan a free barbecue for the entire day, a variety of street sports, dancing, an air show and baseball game.

Meanwhile, Pick City's be-whiskered Community Club members are trimming their beards to compete for the prizes offered for the best set of whiskers shown at the celebration.

June 12, 1947

In behalf of the New Settlers, I wish to announce that we will support the Old Settlers at Hazen June 11 and 12 to the best of our ability.

Fred Isaak has a new assistant Pick City also wishes to "take its ing the law and order in so much confusion.

> Saturday night Pick City will be lit up "like a Christmas tree," and I don't mean the double meaning to the above expression. The Mannhaven Realty Company has purchased a light plant which will be in operation by Saturday.

> Four prefabricated houses have been erected the past week.

July 31, 1947

Wednesday, July 16, was a big night here. Lights were turned on in every building. Our plant and light system were installed by Garrison Electric.

The Hotel Arnold, owned and operated by Arnold Bohrer, now has five rooms for rent.

Friday saw a foundation laid for the Lutheran parochial school which will open in September. Wilbert Zielke is the teacher.

Mercer school No. 2 was also movèd last week.

Monday and Tuesday saw the fist girder placed on the piers of the construction bridge for the Garrison dam.

Sept. 18, 1947 By Mrs. H.F. Mohl

Monday morning saw our children off to their first day of school.

Thursday night, parents held a welcome party for our teacher, Wilbur Zulkie.

Oct. 2, 1947

Applegate's apartment house now has two apartments all painted and ready for renters.

Our enrollment at school has risen to 29 pupils.

NORTH DAKOTA GAME & FISH

Fall Turkey Season Set

The fall turkey season is set with 4,435 licenses available to hunters, 460 more than last year.

Applicants can apply online by visiting the North Dakota Game and Fish website, gf.nd.gov. The deadline is Sept. 6.

Only North Dakota residents are eligible to apply. Nonresidents can apply for remaining fall turkey licenses following the first lottery.

The fall wild turkey season runs from Oct. 14 through Jan. 7, 2024.

Chronic Wasting Disease Proclamation

Big game hunters should note the 2023 <u>chronic wasting disease</u> proclamation for baiting and transportation requirements for deer, elk and moose as a precaution against the spread of chronic wasting disease.

Noteworthy items include:

- •Whole carcasses of animals harvested in North Dakota can remain in the deer unit, or may now be transported anywhere in the state. However, carcass waste must be disposed of via landfill or waste management provider. This does not apply to heads dropped at CWD collection sites or lymph nodes submitted for CWD surveillance. Taxidermists and game processors can also accept intact carcasses of animals harvested within North Dakota but assume responsibility for disposal.
- •A new management strategy that allows <u>baiting restrictions to be removed</u> in a unit if the number of adult deer equivalent to at least 10% of the gun licenses allocated in the unit are tested for CWD within a year, and all the results are negative. If the sampling goal is not met or CWD is confirmed in the unit, the baiting restriction will remain.
- •No new units have been added to the baiting restriction list for 2023-24. Due to the timing of finalizing the proclamation, a one-year pause was placed on adding new units. Units 2K1 and 3B2 are scheduled to be added to the restriction list in 2024 due to a positive CWD detection during the 2022 hunting season within 25 miles in an adjacent unit. They will not be added if the 10% goal is reached this year and all CWD test results are negative.
- •Hunters are prohibited from transporting into North Dakota the whole carcass or parts, except the lower-risk portions, of deer, elk, moose or other members of the cervid family harvested outside of North Dakota.

State Game and Fish Department officials will conduct <u>surveillance of the state</u> by region on a four-year rotation. This year, the CWD surveillance effort will consist of deer gun units in southeastern North Dakota. Outside of this area, hunters can still have their animal tested by taking it to a Game and Fish district office, any deer head collection site (primarily located in the surveillance area) or using a <u>mail-in self-sampling kit</u>. A unit outside the annual surveillance zone is still eligible to have a baiting restriction removed if the sampling goal is met, or can be added as a restricted unit if a positive is found.

Deer Archery Season

North Dakota's deer bow season opens Sept. 1 at noon and continues through Jan. 7, 2024.

Bowhunters can <u>buy a license online</u> at the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, <u>gf.nd.gov</u>, or at vendors linked to the department's <u>online licensing system</u>.

Hunters should plan accordingly and allow for time to receive their tag in the mail, as the tag will arrive by postal mail and not over the counter while the customer waits. This applies while purchasing a bow license at a license vendor, or at the Game and Fish Department's main office in Bismarck. The bow tag will be mailed the next business day after the license is purchased.

All archery hunters must have a bow tag in possession before hunting.

Hunters should refer to the 2023 deer hunting guide for season information and regulations.
